

Update and information for parents



- If your child has been identified as a close contact, they should continue to attend school as normal
- 2 If possible please get a PCR test if identified as a close contact
- Your child does not need to remain in a bubble
- Staff are required to take twice weekly home tests
- 5 Your nursery will no longer trace close contacts
- Your child will not be included in the rapid testing programme





What's changed and what do you need to know?

Child Showing COVID Symptoms

If your child is showing COVID symptoms, you should get them a **PCR test** and the household should **isolate within current government guidelines** until a negative test is returned.



If your child is experiencing a mild fever after **routine vaccinations**, they may still attend the setting as normal.

Attendance

- The number of settings your child attends does not need to be restricted
- Parents and carers may be allowed into communal areas for organised activities e.g. shows. This will depend on the individual setting
- If there is a barrier to accessing childcare due to government guidance or law, you should not be charged during this period

Face Coverings and PPE

Although no longer mandatory, some settings may still request that you wear face coverings in communal areas that are crowded or enclosed

If your child has intimate care needs that require additional PPE, the same PPE should continue to be used by staff in the setting






A LFT test is:

Fast and simple way to test people who do not have symptoms of COVID-19, but who may still be spreading the virus


Those who test positive **must** immediately self-isolate to avoid passing the virus on to others.

A PCR test is:

Used to <u>confirm a suspected case of COVID-</u>

19, where the <u>person is showing symptoms</u>.

Samples for PCRs have to be sent to a lab so often take between 24 hours to three days to return a result



If you have symptoms of COVID-19, do not visit a rapid lateral flow test site. Self-isolate straight away and get a PCR test.
